PETS AT LARGE – RESPONSIBLE PET OWNERSHIP IMPORTANT!



Once again, we are reminding you that pets cannot be allowed to run free. Dogs must be kept under the control of the owner and are NOT permitted to run loose on the lawns of others. They should be led to the curb to use the bathroom rather than being allowed to use the sidewalk, lawns, or flower beds. Of course, owners MUST CLEAN UP after their dogs. Cats must be kept indoors or in the yard of their owners. They are not to roam free and use the flower beds of their neighbors as a 'litter box'. Please be considerate of your neighbors and don't allow your pet(s) to become a nuisance! *Remember...at least one third of the dogs and cats that end up in shelters arrive there as a result of being allowed to run free. Pets running loose are more likely to be injured and infested with fleas, ticks, worms, and other parasites, which they can then bring into your home. Please protect your cats by keeping them inside and keep your dogs in your control.*

DUKE ENERGY INSPECTING GAS LINES

Duke Energy, through its vendor, The Southern Cross Co., will conduct mandatory interior gas meter and line inspections in area homes and small businesses. Inspections will take place between the hours of 8 a.m. and 8 p.m. and will run through early October. The inspections maintain compliance with federal pipeline regulations, and help ensure Duke Energy is able to deliver natural gas to its customers in a safe and reliable manner. The Southern Cross Co. will attempt to call customers approximately one month before inspectors are scheduled to be in an area. If no one is home when inspectors arrive, a door hanger will be left instructing customers to call 866-609-9864 to schedule an appointment. Southern Cross Co. employees will carry photo ID cards at all times, wear yellow safety vests with their logo, and have signage on their vehicles identifying the company. Customers may also contact Duke Energy at 800-544-6900 to verify a contractor's identity.

PAINT COLLECTION AT OLD DALE PARK SCHOOL PARKING LOT – JUNE 29TH



With help from Matthew 25 Ministries, the Village will be holding a latex paint collection event on Saturday, June 29th, in the parking lot next to the Dale Park School at the intersection of Cherry and Chestnut Streets. Cars can enter from Cherry Street, stop and unload their cans of unwanted paint in the boxes provided by Matthew 25 Ministries, and then continue through the parking lot and exit onto Chestnut Street. Members of the Fire Department will be there to assist residents and make sure only acceptable items are deposited into the containers. No oil-based paint, combustible paint, or stain will be accepted. We can only take LATEX paint.

Only one-gallon or five-gallon cans will be accepted. Paint must be in the original container with the original label. Containers without labels cannot be accepted. Finally cans to be disposed of must be at least one-third full. Empty cans or almost empty cans will not be accepted. The paint collected in the drive will be used by Matthew 25 Ministries in their Rainbow Paint Reblending Program, which provides paint to the poor throughout the United States and helps with rebuilding projects following natural disasters like earthquakes and hurricanes.

ELECTRONICS & HAZARDOUS WASTE DROP OFF IN NORWOOD OR ON KELLOGG AVENUE

Hamilton County residents can recycle old computers and electronics for free every Saturday through the end of October by dropping them off at the Cohen Company between 8AM and Noon. They will accept cables, cell phones, keyboards, televisions and other items at either their Norwood location at 5038 Beech Street or their Cincinnati location at 4538 Kellogg Avenue. Hazardous waste such as motor oil and batteries can be taken to Environmental Enterprises at 4600 Spring Grove Avenue from 2PM to 6PM on Tuesdays and from 9AM to 1PM on Saturdays.

EAST ENTRANCE TO VILLAGE TO BE RESTORED

IMPORTANT SURVEY! CONCERNING RECYCLING



For the past several years, the Village of Mariemont has repeatedly increased the amount of trash that we recycle. Currently, we recycle over one-third of all the trash generated by our residents. With recycling at such a high volume in the Village, many residents find it necessary to use *several* of the open recycling bins Rumpke provides. These opens bins are unsightly and cause a lot of clutter, with items being blown away by wind or scattered about by raccoons and other animals, and they attract bees, flies and other insects. Therefore, many residents have inquired about the possibility of getting large recycling carts that have lids and are on wheels. Unfortunately, Rumpke cannot make those containers available to us under our current contract. However, we are looking into making changes to that contract so that 65-gallon recycling carts on wheels would be included in our agreement. Each household would be provided with one container. The 65-gallon containers with lids (as shown at the right) hold about the same amount of recycling as 3 ½ of the bins. If we choose to switch to the wheeled carts AND continue to have behind-the-house service, there would be an increase to our contract rate which would have to be passed along to residents. The amount would be approximately \$25 more per year. HOWEVER, if residents would be willing to wheel only the recycling cart to the curb, with trash still being collected from the rear of the house, there would be no increase and it should help us to avoid future increases for a time. We are asking that each resident fill out the opinion survey form below and return it to the office so that we can tabulate what the majority of residents would prefer when it comes to recycling containers and contract options. We do ask that you include your name and address on the form so that we can make sure each household gets just one vote. Forms without a name and/or address will not be counted in the survey. Once the survey has been tabulated, we will let you know the results. If the results show that most residents would like to change to the recycling carts, the results will go to the Council Committee of the Whole to discuss and vote on it. If Council decides to change the style of recycling containers, the change would not happen until the first of next year, unless Rumpke would allow us to make the changes sooner. **REMEMBER:** *Rumpke will only go with one type of container.*
